Heart Talk Finale!

• Read through Proverbs 31:1-9 together.

The bible speaks clearly and often about how we are to diligently teach our children. Children learn a lot by watching us, but much of our teaching is spoken. The words we speak are so powerful. Lemuel's Mother in Proverbs 31 gives us an example of what loving our children through poor life choices looks like.

Think of what you sound like when your child (or anyone under your authority) crosses a line, disobeys, or makes poor choices.

Lemuel's Mother set a pattern for us to follow when addressing sin in the hearts of our children:

- 1) She reminds Lemuel of her love for him and her responsibility to God for him.
- 2) She asks corrective questions that help him examine his heart and get his attention.
- 3) She corrects and admonishes him to change his ways.
- 4) She cautions him about his lack of self-control and gives him counsel about the path he is on and where it will lead.
- 5) She speaks purpose to his heart.
- Review the list above and consider how you correct your child(ren) (or how were you corrected as a child). How can you more closely align your parenting with the example she has set?
- ❖ Which parts do you struggle the most with?
- ♦ How have your child(ren) responded to your correction in the past?
- ♦ How do you think your child(ren)'s response would change if you followed the pattern Lemuel's mother has set?

After correcting Lemuel, his mother infuses her last statement with life-giving purpose! She gives him a final "why" that is beyond his own selfishness to help encourage him to change his behavior. Regardless of the age of your child(ren), if you don't have a clear "why" in correcting and training them, it is easy for both you and your child to lose motivation and turn aside to selfish action.

- ❖ If you could make a purpose statement for your child(ren), what would it be and why? Use scripture to back up their purpose.
- ❖ Do you have a good handle on your purpose as a child of God? Can you articulate it to yourself when you are struggling with sin?
- ❖ Take a few minutes to write down God's purpose for us as believers based on scripture, as well as for you personally, and for your children. Review it often and memorize the

scriptures. Let the abundance and overflow of your heart be filled with God's life giving purpose to help shape and direct your child(ren).
