## REFLECTION + DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. What might it look like this week to be more aware of His presence in your day-to-day routine?
2. Have you ever worked hard at something and still felt like it produced "nothing"? Where in your life might you be relying more on your effort than dependence on Jesus?
3. Why do you think it was hard (or easy) for the disciples to obey Jesus' strange instruction (to cast the net 7 to 8 feet to the other side)?
4. Is there any area of your life where you sense Jesus asking you to obey – even if it doesn't make sense to you?
5. How have you experienced God's provision in your life – big or small? Is there anywhere in your life you need to trust His provision right now?
6. What stands out to you about how Jesus treats Peter after his failure? Why is it often hard to believe that failure doesn't define us?
7. Why do you think Jesus asks Peter about love instead of confronting him on his failure directly?
8. Where might following Jesus cost you something right now? How do you usually respond when obedience becomes difficult or costly?
9. Why is it important for Jesus to feed the disciples before commissioning them? What spiritual application can we learn from this for ourselves?
10. What does Peter's story teach us about God's grace? Where do you need to believe that your story isn't finished yet?
