2. Fishing Series: Story Church January 17, 2021

Recap

Previously on Story Church: Jeremy Martin, an irreligious Chicago lawyer returned home to Mt. Pleasant for his niece's baptism. At church, he ran into Lauren Sanchez, a friend from high school, who surprised him when she stood up after the baptism and walked to the front of the sanctuary.

Scene 2

She said, "Don't worry, my dad has a bunch of equipment. My parents don't know what to make of this church stuff yesterday. I think they're worried I'm going cuckoo, but fishing is sane in my family so they'll let me borrow it. We can go out to the Skunk River at Oakland Mills State Park and go fishing at the dam. I'll bring us some food to eat for a picnic."

Jeremy didn't have anything else to do. Then he stopped and said, "Wait, don't you have to work?" She said, "No, I just quit my job."

"What?!"

The Skunk River is a tributary of the mighty Mississippi River. Its headwaters are in north central lowa before flowing southeast to the Mississippi. It had been a hundred years since a drowning there. There was a close call just ten years before when two people from Mt. Pleasant tried to go over the dam in a small boat. The water pushed the boat down and sank it. Luckily, the two geniuses were able to escape and swim ashore a mile downriver.¹

The dam was a great fishing pier, though. People stood on the concrete abutments on each side of the river and tossed their lines in for bass, walleye, catfish, and carp.

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Jeremy didn't know what he was doing but Lauren helped him cast off. After they got their lines in the water and quieted down, Jeremy said, "So what happened with your job?"

"Why, what's going on?"

Scene 3

In the car Jeremy thanked her for taking him fishing. He said he was sorry they didn't actually catch any fish but the food was good and he liked hanging out with her.

With a twinkle in her eye, Lauren said, "No worries, it wasn't even the right time to go, but I wasn't trying to catch fish."

"What? Then why'd we go fishing?"

Lauren said, "I'm trying to catch something else."

Jeremy hesitated and awkwardly said, "Look, Lauren, you probably know I always liked you in high school, but I'm not looking for a relationship now with someone four hours away from where I live."
